The Crazies are home to many species of mammals and birds, including eagles, hawks, wild turkey, black bear, mule and whitetail deer, mountain lion, elk, wolverine and mountain goats.

Mountain goats inhabit rocky cliffs, and endure the freezing winter temperatures of the Crazies.

This harsh habitat allows the goats to rest midday while keeping a wary lookout for their predators. With a sharp eye you may spot these cliff climbers during the morning or evening hours.

The Crazy Mountains run almost 25 miles north to south, and rise above the Montana Prairie to an elevation of 11,214 feet atop Crazy Peak.

Fifty million years ago, the area was covered by a vast inland sea. Magma rose inside fissures from deep in the earth through the sea's muddy bottom. These cooled into huge columns of igneous rock. Over time, the surrounding mud and softer elements eroded away.

During the last of the ice ages, glaciers deeply gouged this mountain landscape, making the Crazies the most impressive of the "island mountain ranges" in central Montana.
